We are fortunate to have an AAMHO chapter in our community. If you are a homeowner, it is to your benefit to belong. You can ask questions and join at the December 10th HCC Elections meeting.

The Arizona Association of Manufactured Home (and RV) Owners is a non-profit organization whose mission is to improve the lifestyle of manufactured home and recreational vehicle owners throughout the state of Arizona.

AAMHO is recognized as the home owner's main representative by the State Legislature, and as such monitors any proposed bills or statutes that may impact our basic rights as a resident. It successfully lobbied for the passage of the Arizona Mobile Home Parks Landlord and Tenant Act. This act sets out the specific obligations of both landlords and tenants and includes remedies in the event of non-compliance.

Imagine you are happily living in the park and the landlord

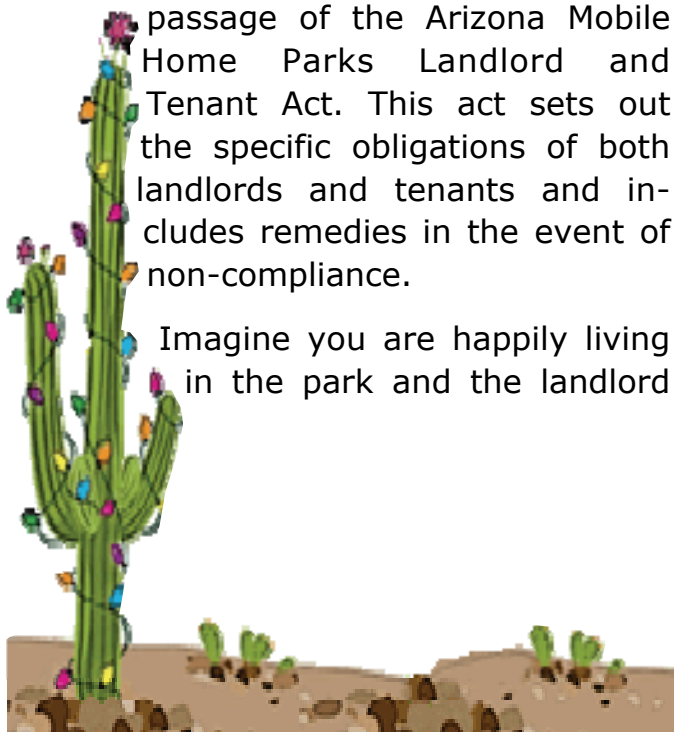
nearly doubles the rent or orders you to move your home out without giving you a valid reason. As an individual, can you do anything? Not much unless you hire a lawyer. AAMHO is a large group of homeowners that can, and has in the past, overcome such problems for its members.

Your local chapter of AAMHO at the Highlands of Brentwood is your first line of defense against capricious behavior on the part of the park owner. Annual dues are \$30. At the December 10th HCC meeting, Irene Helm and Jim McDaniel will be on hand to answer questions and take membership dues. Please remit dues on a separate check payable to "AAMHO."

My phone number has changed this year. You can reach me at 480-659-1493 or come on by to unit #146. See you on the golf course.

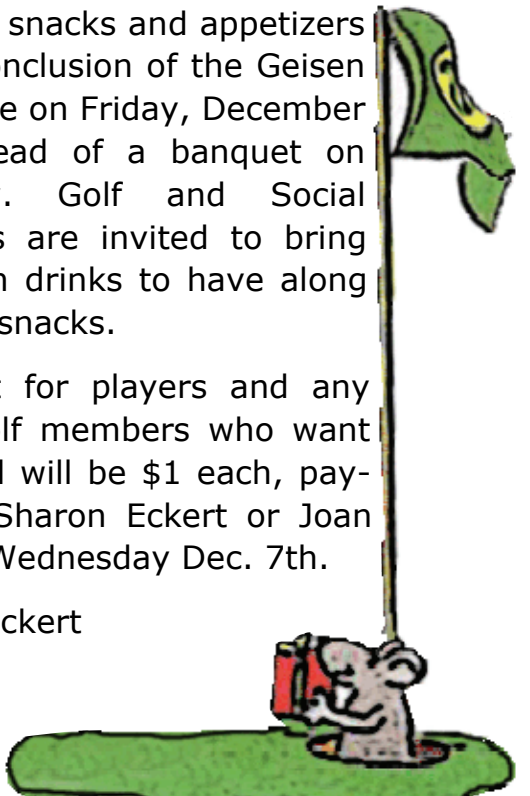
